### Introduction

This document is called the *List of Covered Drugs* (also known as the *Drug List*). It tells you which prescription drugs and over-the-counter (OTC) drugs and non-drug products are covered by UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4. The *Drug List* also tells you if there are any special rules or restrictions on any drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4. Key terms and their definitions appear in the last chapter of the *Evidence of Coverage*.

- ❖ The *Drug List* (formulary) may change on January 1 of each year, and from time to time during the plan year. You will receive notice when necessary.
- ❖ You can always check UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4's up-to-date *List of Covered Drugs* online at **MyUHC.com/CommunityPlan** or by calling Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page. The call is free.

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## B. Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Find answers here to questions you have about this *List of Covered Drugs*. You can read all of the FAQ to learn more or look for a question and answer.

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### B1. What prescription drugs are on the *List of Covered Drugs*? (We call the *List of Covered Drugs* the “*Drug List*” for short.)

The drugs on the *List of Covered Drugs* that starts in section C1 are the drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4. The drugs are available at pharmacies within our network. A pharmacy is in our network if we have an agreement with them to work with us and provide you services. We refer to these pharmacies as “network pharmacies.”

- UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 will cover all medically necessary drugs on the *Drug List* if:
  - your doctor or other prescriber says you need them to get better or stay healthy,
  - UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 agrees that the drug is medically necessary for you, **and**
  - you fill the prescription at a UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 network pharmacy.
- In some cases, you have to do something before you can get a drug. Refer to question B4 for more information.

You can also find an up-to-date list of drugs that we cover on our website at **MyUHC.com/CommunityPlan** or call Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page.

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### B2. Does the *Drug List* ever change?

Yes, and UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 must follow Medicare and Medicaid rules when making changes. We may add or remove drugs on the *Drug List* during the year.

We may also change our rules about drugs. For example, we could:

- Decide to require or not require prior authorization for a drug. (Prior authorization is permission from UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 before you can get a drug.)
- Add or change the amount of a drug you can get (called quantity limits).
- Add or change step therapy restrictions on a drug. (Step therapy means you must try one drug before we will cover another drug.)

For more information on these drug rules, refer to question B4.

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If you are taking a drug that was covered at the **beginning** of the year, we will generally not remove or change coverage of that drug **during the rest of the year** unless:

- a new, cheaper drug comes on the market that works as well as a drug on the *Drug List* now, **or**
- we learn that a drug is not safe, **or**
- a drug is removed from the market.

Questions B3 and B6 below have more information on what happens when the *Drug List* changes.

- You can always check UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4's up-to-date *Drug List* online at **MyUHC.com/CommunityPlan**. Updates to the *Drug List* are posted on the website monthly.
- You can also call Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page to check the current *Drug List*.

### **B3. What happens when there is a change to the *Drug List*?**

Some changes to the *Drug List* will happen **immediately**. For example:

- **Substitutions of certain new versions of drugs.** We may immediately remove the drugs from the *Drug List* if we replace them with certain new versions of that drug, but your cost for the new drug will remain \$0 with the same or fewer restrictions. When we add a new version of a drug, we may also decide to keep the brand name drug or original biological product on the list but change its coverage rules or limits.
  - We may not tell you before we make this change, but we will send you information about the specific change we made once it happens.
  - We can make these changes only if the drug we are adding:
    - is a new generic version of a brand name drug, **or**
    - is a certain new biosimilar version of original biological products on the *Drug List* (for example, adding an interchangeable biosimilar that can be substituted for an original biological product without a new prescription).
    - Some of these drug types may be new to you. For more information, refer to Section B14.
  - You or your provider can ask for an exception from these changes. We will send you a notice with the steps you can take to ask for an exception. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information on exceptions.

- **A drug is taken off the market.** If the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) says a drug you are taking is not safe or effective or the drug's manufacturer takes a drug off the market, we may immediately take it off the *Drug List*. If you are taking the drug, we will send you a notice after we make the change. Contact your doctor or other prescriber and ask about your other options.

**We may make other changes that affect the drugs you take.** We will tell you in advance about these other changes to the *Drug List*. These changes might happen if:

- The FDA provides new guidance or there are new clinical guidelines about a drug.
- We remove a brand name drug from the *Drug List* when adding a generic drug that is not new to the market, **or**
- we remove an original biological product when adding a biosimilar, **or**
- we change the coverage rules or limits for the brand name drug.

When these changes happen, we will:

- tell you at least 30 days before we make the change to the *Drug List* **or**
- let you know and give you a 30-day supply of the drug after you ask for a refill.

This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber. They can help you decide:

- if there is a similar drug on the *Drug List* you can take instead **or**
- whether to ask for an exception from these changes. To learn more about exceptions, refer to questions B10 - B12.

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#### **B4. Are there any restrictions or limits on drug coverage or any required actions to take to get certain drugs?**

Yes. Some drugs have coverage rules or have limits on the amount you can get. In some cases you or your doctor or other prescriber must do something before you can get the drug. For example:

- **Prior authorization:** For some drugs, you or your doctor or other prescriber must get authorization from UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 before you fill your prescription. Prior authorization is different from a referral. UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 may not cover the drug if you don't get prior authorization.
- **Quantity limits:** Sometimes UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 limits the amount of a drug you can get.

- **Step therapy:** Sometimes UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 requires you to do step therapy. This means you will have to try drugs in a certain order for your medical condition. You might have to try one drug before we will cover another drug. Under Virginia law, your doctor or other prescriber must document either verbally or in writing why they feel the first drug is not effective for you and ask for the other drug to be covered.

You can find out if your drug has any additional requirements or limits by looking in the tables in section C1. You can also get more information by visiting our website at **MyUHC.com/CommunityPlan**. We have posted online documents that explain our prior authorization and step therapy restrictions. You may also ask us to send you a copy.

**You can ask for an exception from these limits.** This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber. They can help you decide if there is a similar drug on the *Drug List* you can take instead or whether to ask for an exception. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information about exceptions.

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### **B5. How will I know if the drug I want has limits or if there are required actions to take to get the drug?**

The table in the List of Drugs by Drug Type has a column labeled “Necessary actions, restrictions, or limits on use.”

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### **B6. What happens if UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 changes their rules about how they cover some drugs (for example, prior authorization, quantity limits, and/or step therapy restrictions)?**

In some cases, we will tell you in advance if we add or change prior authorization, quantity limits, and/or step therapy restrictions on a drug. Refer to question B3 for more information about this advance notice and situations where we may not be able to tell you in advance when our rules about drugs on the *Drug List* change.

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### **B7. How can I find a drug on the *Drug List*?**

There are two ways to find a drug:

- You can search alphabetically, **or**
- You can search by drug type.

To search **alphabetically**, look for your drug in the Index of Covered Drugs section. You can find it on page 239. The Index of Covered Drugs is an alphabetical list of all of the drugs included in the *Drug List*. Brand name drugs and generic drugs as well as over-the-counter (OTC) drugs are listed in the index.

To search **by drug type**, find the section C1 labeled “List of Drugs by Drug Type”. The drugs in this section are grouped into categories by type. For example, if you are taking a medicine for migraines, you should look in the “Antimigraine Agents” category. That is where you will find drugs that treat migraines.

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## **B8. What if the drug I want to take is not on the *Drug List*?**

If you don't find your drug on the *Drug List*, call Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page and ask about it. If you learn that UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 will not cover the drug, you can do one of these things:

- Ask Member Services for a list of drugs like the one you want to take. Then show the list to your doctor or other prescriber. They can prescribe a drug on the *Drug List* that is like the one you want to take. **Or**
- You can ask UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 to make an exception to cover your drug. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information about exceptions.

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## **B9. What if I am a new UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 member and can't find my drug on the *Drug List* or have a problem getting my drug?**

We can help. We may cover a temporary 30-day supply of your drug during the first 90 days you are a member of UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4. This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber. They can help you decide if there is a similar drug on the *Drug List* you can take instead, or whether to ask for an exception.

If your prescription is written for fewer days, we will allow multiple refills to provide up to a maximum of 30 days of medication.

We will cover a 30-day supply of your drug if:

- you are taking a drug that is not on our *Drug List*, **or**
- health plan rules do not let you get the amount ordered by your prescriber, **or**
- the drug requires prior authorization by UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4, **or**
- you are taking a drug that is part of a step therapy restriction.

If you are taking a drug that UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 does not consider to be a Part D drug, you have the right to get a one-time, 72-hour emergency supply of the drug.

If you are in a nursing home or other long-term care facility and need a drug that is not on the *Drug List* or if you cannot easily get the drug you need, we can help. If you have been in the plan for more than 90 days, live in a long-term care facility, and need a supply right away:

- We will cover one 31-day supply of the drug you need (unless you have a prescription for fewer days), whether or not you are a new UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 member.
- This is in addition to the temporary supply during the first 90 days you are a member of UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4.

If you are going through a change in your level of care, such as being transferred from a hospital to a long-term care facility, any time during the year, we may cover a temporary 31-day supply of the drug you need. This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber about other treatment options or to try to get an exception. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information about exceptions.

We will not pay for more of your drug after you get a temporary supply unless you receive authorization from the plan.

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## **B10. Can I ask for an exception to cover my drug?**

Yes. You can ask UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 to make an exception to cover a drug that is not on the *Drug List*.

You can also ask us to change the rules on your drug.

- For example, UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 may limit the amount of a drug we will cover. If your drug has a limit, you can ask us to change the limit and cover more.
- Other examples: You can ask us to drop step therapy restrictions or prior authorization requirements.

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## **B11. How can I ask for an exception?**

To ask for an exception, call Member Services. A Member Services representative will work with you and your provider to help you ask for an exception. You can also read Chapter 9, section 7.2 of the *Evidence of Coverage* to learn more about exceptions.

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## **B12. How long does it take to get an exception?**

After we get a statement from your prescriber supporting your request for an exception, we will give you a decision within 72 hours. Your doctor or other prescriber can fax or mail the statement to us. Or your doctor or other prescriber can tell us on the phone, and then fax or mail the statement. If you have questions, call Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page.

If you or your prescriber think your health may be harmed if you have to wait 72 hours for a decision, you can ask for an expedited exception. This is a faster decision. If your prescriber supports your request, we will give you a decision within 24 hours of getting your prescriber's supporting statement.

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## **B13. What are generic drugs?**

Generic drugs are made up of the same active ingredients as brand name drugs. They usually cost less than the brand name drug and generally work just as well. They usually don't have well-known names. Generic drugs are approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). There are generic drugs available for many brand name drugs. Generic drugs usually can be substituted for brand name drugs at the pharmacy without a new prescription - depending on state laws.

UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 covers both brand name drugs and generic drugs.

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## **B14. What are original biological products and how are they related to biosimilars?**

When we refer to drugs, this could mean a drug or a biological product. Biological products are drugs that are more complex than typical drugs. Since biological products are more complex than typical drugs, instead of having a generic form, they have forms that are called biosimilars. Generally, biosimilars work just as well as the original biological product and may cost less. There are biosimilar alternatives for some original biological products. Some biosimilars are interchangeable biosimilars and, depending on state laws, may be substituted for the original biological product at the pharmacy without needing a new prescription, just like generic drugs can be substituted for brand name drugs.

For more information on drug types, refer to **Chapter 5** of the *Evidence of Coverage*.

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**B15. What are OTC drugs?**

OTC stands for “over-the-counter.” UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 covers some OTC drugs when they are written as prescriptions by your provider.

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**B16. Does UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 cover non-drug OTC products?**

UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 covers some non-drug OTC products when they are written as prescriptions by your provider. Examples of non-drug OTC products include gauze pads and bandages. Contact your Care Coordinator, your provider or Member Services for more information.

You can read the UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 *Drug List* to find out what non-drug OTC products are covered.

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**B17. Does UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 cover long-term supplies of prescriptions?**

Yes. UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 offers two ways to get a long-term supply (also called an extended supply) of “maintenance” drugs on our plan’s *Drug List*. (Maintenance drugs are drugs that you take on a regular basis, for a chronic or long-term medical condition.)

- **Retail pharmacy.** Some retail pharmacies in our network allow you to get a long-term supply of maintenance drugs. Your *Provider and Pharmacy Directory* tells you which pharmacies in our network can give you a long-term supply of maintenance drugs.
- **Mail-order.** Our plan’s mail-order service allows you to order up to a 100-day supply. To get order forms and information about filling your prescriptions by mail, please reference your *Provider and Pharmacy Directory* to find the mail service pharmacies in our network. If you use a mail-order pharmacy not in the plan’s network, your prescription will not be covered.

For more information about getting a long-term supply of drugs, call Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page.

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**B18. Can I get prescriptions delivered to my home from my local pharmacy?**

Your local pharmacy may be able to deliver your prescription to your home. You can call your pharmacy to find out if they offer home delivery.

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**B19. What is my copay?**

UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 members have no copays for prescription and OTC drugs and non-drug products as long as the member follows the plan's rules. Refer to questions B15 and B16 for more information about OTC drugs and non-drug products.

Tiers are groups of drugs on our *Drug List*. Your plan has 1 tier named "Covered Drugs." All covered drugs are in this tier.

- Tier 1 Generic drugs have a \$0 copay.
- Tier 1 Brand name drugs have a \$0 copay.

OTCs have a \$0 copay.

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## C. Overview of the *List of Covered Drugs*

The *List of Covered Drugs* gives you information about the drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4. If you have trouble finding your drug in the list, turn to the Index of Covered Drugs that begins in section D. The index alphabetically lists all drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4.

**Note:** The (OTC) in the “What the drug will cost you (tier level)” column means the drug is not a “Part D drug.” These drugs have different rules for appeals.

- An appeal is a formal way of asking us to review a decision we made about your coverage and to change it if you think we made a mistake.
- For example, we might decide that a drug that you want is not covered or is no longer covered by Medicare or Cardinal Care.
- If you or your prescriber disagrees with our decision, you can appeal. If you ever have a question, call Member Services at the numbers listed at the bottom of this page.
- You can also read **Chapter 9** of the *Evidence of Coverage* to learn how to appeal a decision.

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### C1. List of Drugs by Drug Type

The drugs in this section are grouped into categories by type. For example, if you are taking a medicine for migraines, you should look in the “Antimigraine Agents” category. That is where you will find drugs that treat migraines.

The first column of the table lists the name of the drug. Generic drugs are listed in lower-case italics (for example, *simvastatin*), brand name drugs are capitalized (for example, HUMALOG), and OTC drugs and non-drug products are listed in lower-case (for example, aspirin). The information in the “Necessary actions, restrictions, or limits on use” column tells you if UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 has any rules for covering your drug.

**Here are the meanings of the codes used in the “Necessary actions, restrictions, or limits on use” column:**

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#### **PA – Prior authorization**

For some drugs, you or your doctor or other prescriber must get authorization from UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 before you fill your prescription. Prior authorization is different from a referral. UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 may not cover the drug if you don’t get prior authorization.

#### **QL – Quantity limits**

Sometimes UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 limits the amount of a drug you can get.

#### **ST – Step therapy**

Sometimes UHC Dual Complete VA-Y4 requires you to do step therapy. This means you will have to try drugs in a certain order for your medical condition. You might have to try one drug before we will cover another drug. Under Virginia law, your doctor or other prescriber must document either

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verbally or in writing why they feel the first drug is not effective for you and ask for the other drug to be covered.

**B/D – Medicare Part B or Part D**

Depending on how this drug is used, it may be covered by either Medicare Part B (doctor and outpatient health care) or Medicare Part D (prescription drugs). Your doctor or prescriber may need to provide the plan with more information about how this drug will be used to make sure it's correctly covered by Medicare.

**LA – Limited access**

Drugs are considered “limited access” if the FDA says the drug can only be given out by certain facilities, doctors or prescribers. These drugs may require extra handling, provider coordination or patient education that can't be done at a network pharmacy.

**MME – Morphine milligram equivalent**

Additional quantity limits may apply to all opioid drugs used to treat pain. This additional limit is called a cumulative Morphine Milligram Equivalent (MME). It's designed to monitor safe dosing levels of opioids for people who may be taking more than one opioid drug for pain management. If your doctor or prescriber prescribes more than this amount or thinks the limit is not right for your situation, you or your doctor or prescriber can ask the plan to cover the additional quantity.

**7D – 7-day limit**

An opioid drug used to treat pain may be limited to a 7-day supply if you don't have a recent history of using opioids. This limit helps minimize long-term opioid use. If you are new to the plan and have a recent history of using opioids, the pharmacy may override the limit when appropriate.

**DL – Dispensing limit**

Dispensing limits apply to this drug. This drug is limited to a 1-month supply per prescription.
